

St. Andrew's Tidings For the Week of May 8 Message from Margaret:

Luke makes it apparent, according to George Hunsberger, that the day of the ascension was poised-suspended, as it were—between heaven and earth, between the beginning and the end. This was not the culmination—too much was yet awaiting the fulfillment of God's intentions. Not was it the beginning—so thoroughly had Jesus' incarnation and suffering and death and resurrection begun the triumph of God's reign. Ascension Day stood wonderfully between, as we ourselves stand continuously between the beginnings and the endings of God's designs. We stand after the garden of Genesis where something went dreadfully wrong....

We live in the liminality of "the day" when Jesus was taken up. But how? What guides us in that difficult place and time? Luke marks "the day" as the one on which Jesus was "taken up" and herein lies the clue for us. But that depends on how we take the phrase, from what perspective we view what is happening in Jesus' "ascension." Was this, as it would seem to appear to so many of us as the most normal assumption, a "homecoming" for Jesus? In some respects, and from a certain vantage point, that seems to be so. Jesus had come into the world. The Word by whom "all things came into being" had "become flesh" and lived among us. ... Now he is returning to the right hand of God.

But the language of Luke hints at something else. This was the day in which he was "taken up," he was "lifted up" and a cloud "took" him. The angels announce that "This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come again in the same way as you saw him go into heaven" Is it closer to the point, then, to see this more as a homeleaving than as a homecoming. A homeleaving for a time, after which he will return?

...Our mission is fueled with anticipation, if our humanity is on loan to the deity. There is yet a homecoming. This Jesus will come again in the same way. The world is destined to be made whole. Justice will roll down like waters-and

righteousness like a mighty stream! The knowledge of Yahweh will cover the earth. The one who was taken up from us is coming to us once more! Hallelujah!


Supper at Grace
