St. Andrew's Tidings For the Week of January 24th

Message from Margaret,

In our Gospel reading from Luke this week, Jesus reads the Word of God in the Synagogue of Nazareth and explains it to the congregation gathered there. This story follows directly after Jesus' experience of the wilderness retreat that prepared him for his vocation. That retreat had been an experience of temptation regarding the way in which Jesus would fulfill that vocation.

Jesus had over come the temptation to bribe would be disciples with handouts of food; and that of seeking political power to do good; and that of coercing a following by performing stupendous signs. Now he returns in the power of the Spirit to Galilee to teach in the village synagogues. At first the message is popular and brings to Jesus fame and praise. But there is more to be done than telling people what they want to hear; and in Nazareth Jesus begins to outline the prophetic message for his day.

The reading offered was from the Isaiah scroll. Our Gospel gives it in the Septuagint version which Luke's readers would know. It adds to the known Hebrew text the phrase "recovery of sight to the blind." Some modern translations omit the words "bind up the broken-hearted" because they are missing from several of the earliest copies of Luke. Quoting from this text, Jesus really gets close attention from the hearers. The reading closes with the words: "Today, this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." This is to say, that in the ministry of Jesus, God's work of deliverance would be accomplished. Jesus goes on from there to heal all sorts of people and was driven out of town and many in the synagogue were enraged by him.

In enlarging the boundary of who may be included in the people of God, a prospect of divisiveness appeared. But what Jesus was trying to do and say, was to look for God where people hurt. The Gospel happens most powerfully when the Spirit of the lord, dwelling in the Lord's people, is brought to bear on human suffering. Looking for God? Look where the Gospel intersects with the poor.

Look where the Gospel releases the captives, the blind and the oppressed. It is there that we see God.

A marvelous Hasidic tale is told about an elderly rabbi, renowned for his purity, who was unexpectedly approached by a youthful disciple. The impetuous seeker fell at the feet of the rabbi and exclaimed: "My master, I love you!" The old teacher looked up from his books and asked the fervent disciple: "Do you know what hurts me, my son?"

The young man looked puzzled, but composed himself and replied: "I don't understand your question, rabbi. I am trying to tell you how much you mean to me, and you confuse me with irrelevant questions." The rabbi rejoined, "My question is neither confusing nor irrelevant, for if you do not know what hurts me, how can you truly love me?"


Would you like a Norfolk Island Pine?
