

St. Andrew's Tidings

Message from Margaret

The story in our gospel lesson this week is about a blind man whom Jesus causes to see; and it is basically about the spiritual blindness of those who are offended by this sign of Jesus. The story begins with some people wanting to know if the man's blindness is caused by sin-either that of his

parents or because the man sinned. And we notice how Jesus answers this question. Jesus always held to the first part of the syllogism-that sin leads to suffering. However he does not accept that suffering is there because of the individual sin. Jesus says it is not because this man sinned, or because of some sin by the parents, but this situation is there so that the glory of God might be manifested. Jesus tells us not to speculate endlessly why this happened, but to ask ourselves, "What can be done so that the glory of the creator can fulfill itself?"

So Jesus calls the man to himself, picks up some dirt, spits on it and makes a little mud cake and puts it on the man's eyes, and tells him to go and wash it off in the pool of Siloam—which is one of the few places of fresh water within the walls of Jerusalem. The man, trusting in Jesus, does what he asks, and his sight is restored. And then the eyes that had been freshly opened, looked upon one of the ugliest controversies in the New Testament. There are all sorts of arguments as to how this could have happened. The Pharisees get into the act because Jesus does this on the Sabbath, and this breaks one of their laws. But Jesus is able to use even this. He calls the man and says, "Do you believe in the Son of God-the Son of Man.?" And the man honestly asks, "Who is that?" And Jesus responds, "The man who talks with you is he." And with that, the man believes. He sees the source of his healing and has the grace to say "thank you" as he says, "I believe," and falls down and worships him.

We who have our eyesight live in a world full of light. Light comes to us in countless forms and colors. So much light surrounds us that we miss more of it than we see, and what we do see is so familiar that we ignore it. We are, in effect, blind to most of the light in our lives. The situation is not so different when the light in question is not visual light but *the light that is Christ*. The beginning of the

Gospel of John tells us that "what has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people."

We are often blind to the light that is Christ, just as the religious leaders in the story. We erect screens before ourselves, letting light filter through only those openings that we determine and control. But God's Spirit cannot be contained by us. God wants to overcome our stubborn blindness. Jesus sent the man born blind to wash in the waters of Siloam. The man returned healed of his blindness. In this Lenten season we prepare to go, or return, to the waters of baptism. In these waters our own blindness again will be washed away. Then we, too, will be able to see Christ's light and confess with the man, "Lord, I believe." We will walk as children of the light.
