

# St. Andrew's Tidings Message from Deacon Ray

#### Saint who?

My students were getting excited about the trip to New York, making plans with friends on what to pack and what they hope to do in big city. The day before we left one of my students in class,

obviously a good Catholic, asked if she could put a St. Christopher statue on the dash of the bus. I told her it was fine with me, but soon the question lead to some questions from other students about saints, patron saints, saint days, etc. I wisely stepped out of the way and let them discuss it for a few minutes. Actually the young lady that first started the whole conversation did a pretty good job of answering the questions.

I wish I had recorded her answers but I didn't, so I turned to the source of all great knowledge today – Wikipedia. "A patron saint or a patron hallow is a saint who in some Christian denominations is regarded as the tutelary spirit or heavenly advocate of a nation, place, craft, activity, class, clan, family, or person. Patron saints, having already transcended to the metaphysical, are believed to be able to intercede effectively for the needs of their special charges."

OK, that's a bit technical but you get the idea. Anglicans, Catholics, and various Orthodox faiths all have a list of recognized Saints. The list gets modified occasionally but most have been around a long time. The students that asked about the practice of saints probably attend other branches of Protestantism where the practice is considered a form of idolatry. I do find it interesting that these same students are quick to observe saints like St. Patrick, St. Valentine, and especially St. Nicolas.

Saints often become the patrons of places where they were born or had been active. In Latin America and the Philippines, Spanish and Portuguese explorers often named a location for the saint on whose feast or commemoration they first visited the place, with that Saint naturally becoming the area's patron. Right here is great example of that; when the English first "discovered" our bay (long after the Native Americans and the Spanish were here) it was St. Andrew's feast day so that is where this area got the name.

Professions sometimes get a patron saint owing to that individual being involved somewhat with it. Lacking such a saint, an occupation would have a patron whose acts or miracles in some way recall the profession. For example, when the previously unknown profession of

photography appeared in the 19th century, Saint Veronica was made its patron, owing to how her veil miraculously received the imprint of Christ's face after she wiped the blood and sweat off.

I found several quasi-official lists of Saints that range from the usual obvious ones to the obscure like Isidore of Seville, recognized by the Vatican in early 2000 as the patron saint of the internet. Almost every day has some saint that is recognized, which brings us to this past Sunday, March 30, 2014. This the feast day for Saint Innocent of Alaska; and if you are like me then you are probably thinking "Saint who?"

Saint Innocent of Alaska (August 26, 1797 - March 31, 1879), also known as Saint Innocent Metropolitan of Moscow, was a Russian Orthodox missionary priest, then the first Orthodox bishop and archbishop in the Americas, and finally the Metropolitan of Moscow and all Russia. Remembered for his missionary work, scholarship, and leadership in Alaska and the Russian Far East during the 19th century, he is known for his abilities as a scholar, linguist, and administrator, as well as his great zeal for his work.

As a missionary priest he took his wife and family with him. In these territories he learned several languages and dialects of the indigenous peoples. He wrote many of the earliest scholarly works about the native peoples of Alaska, including dictionaries and grammars for their languages for which he devised writing systems; also, he wrote religious works in, and translated parts of the Bible into, several of these languages. His books were published beginning in 1840.

On October 6, 1977 the Russian Orthodox Church, acting on the official request of the Orthodox Church in America, glorified (canonized) Innocent as a saint, giving him the title "Enlightener of the Aleuts, Apostle to America." On the liturgical calendar of the Episcopal Church (USA), Innocent is honored with a feast day on March 30. So now you know the answer to "Saint who?"

Maybe next to her St. Christopher I should have put my bobble-head plastic Jesus that I used in that sermon last year, at least everyone would understand who he is I hope.


#### **COMMUNION PROCEEDURE**


