

<u>St. Andrew's Tidings</u> Message from Margaret+

The Gospel for Sunday offers us several different images of the kingdom of God, each offering a different insight into the meaning of God's reign. But the bottom

line for all of us is that God's kingdom is already in and among us. We often ask, what in the world is the Kingdom like? And Jesus responds: "...it's kinda like this, and it's kinda like that." Arthur Koestler, the renowned artist, once said that the artist is someone on a tightrope between the practical world and the world of imagination. Jesus, as the "artist" of the Kingdom, displays this tension in his teaching. He always speaks of the Kingdom in terms of images or figures; the Kingdom of heaven is like...he never says that the Kingdom is this or that.

Jesus used images from the "practical world" to excite the imagination of his listeners about the realm of the Spirit. The parables represented for the people "sword bridges" over which they could pass from the world of the practical to the world of the imagination. So what do we make of the images Jesus speaks of in our reading.

The Mustard Seed and the Yeast: Whereas "growth" for us moderns happens as a result of more elbow grease, using sound management techniques, better marketing, the Kingdom grows as a mystery. What begins as a reality no bigger than a coffee bean metamorphoses into a bird-hosting bush—by anything but human means. It happens through the work of the Holy Spirit—and the Spirit produces more bounty than we ever imagined. Yet this growth is hidden to the human eye—like the working of yeast to leaven flour. The only restrictions on Kingdom growth may be our willingness to expose our mustard-seed faith to the sunlight of the spirit, and to put the "yeast of God" in the "flour" life presents us.

The Treasure and the Merchant: The Kingdom is of extraordinary value hidden, waiting to be discovered. Once the Kingdom is discovered in all of its exquisite value, it becomes a no-brainer. You give up everything else in order to acquire it. How smart do you have to be to sell all you have to buy the winning lottery ticket from its unsuspecting owner? In the "treasure" image, the Kingdom is *found* by us. In the "merchant" parable, the Kingdom is in *search* of us. We are found by the Kingdom, the merchant seeking pearls. Thus we see the Kingdom dynamic working both ways. We find the treasure of the Kingdom, but the Kingdom treasure also finds us.

The Net: Theologian, C. H. Dodd, in *The Parables of the Kingdom*, contends that the "moral" of this parable is not part of the original saying—that is the bad fish get tossed out of the net at the end of the age, while the "good fish" stay in it. Dodd feels that the parable, in its original form, is told in response to Jesus' friendship with "tax collectors and sinners." In reality, Jesus had little success with interesting the "good fish" of society in the Kingdom message. Like the parables of the Lost Sheep, the Lost Coin, and the Prodigal Son, the theme of the net parable is *radical inclusiveness*—the Kingdom gathers in notorious sinners, as well the notorious, all of us, no matter who we are. Everyone is invited to the Kingdom Feast, just as they are taken up in the Kingdom Net. There aren't two nets. As Paul says, "One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God-who is above all and through all and in all.




